

Fall Reopening Plan

Given the recent public health trends, the Las Virgenes Unified School District has decided to start the school year on August 19th, with all students engaged in a virtual learning format. LVUSD hopes to allow students to return to campus in the following weeks, depending on improving public health data from Los Angeles County.

LVUSD has requested that families still register for either the Virtual Academy or the on-campus option for future planning. Students who are in the Virtual Academy will have a 100% virtual experience for at least a trimester

(elementary) or a semester (secondary). Students who request the on-campus option will be assigned a regular school schedule and classroom assignment as they would during an in-person school year. While their school experience will begin with their teacher(s) virtually, they will exit the virtual learning model and return to their school campuses with the same classroom teacher(s) as soon as safely possible.

Wildfire Readiness

Residents can play a key role in not only helping to prevent wildfire, but by making the area around their property more defensible. The Fire Department's "Ready-Set-Go" Personal Wildfire Action Plan provides information on creating a defensible home along with additional information on evacuations and other pertinent material. To create your own action plan please download the Ready! Set! Go! Wildfire Action Plan at fire.lacounty.gov/rsg or scan the QR code with your smartphone.



Before a Wildfire

Create a defensible space so that your home has a higher chance of surviving a wildfire. Avoid having high-hazard plants near your homes such as Shrubs Eucalyptus, Juniper, Palm, Pine Trees and Pampas Grass. Make sure smoke detectors are on and test them monthly. Make sure you have unexpired fire extinguishers on hand as well and train each family member how to use it properly. Make sure family members know where the main utilities shut-off is. Clear pine needles, leaves, and other debris from your roof and gutters. Cut any tree branches within 10 feet of your roof. Screen or enclose rain gutters to prevent accumulation of plant debris.

When You Need to Go:

Go early. By leaving early, you will give your family the best chance of surviving a wildfire. You also help firefighters by keeping roads clear of congestion, enabling them to move more freely and do their job. Leave as soon as evacuation is recommended by emergency personnel to avoid being caught in fire, smoke, or road congestion. Monitor the City's website, official social media accounts, and listen to your local radio/TV for announcements from law enforcement and other emergency personnel.

Temporarily Suspended For Fall Semester



New limitations on the number of riders allowed on a single bus accompanied by financial constraints to operate the system based on the COVID-19 protocols have caused our City to temporarily suspend the Westlake Village Transit Program. At this time, the bus system will not operate for the Fall school semester. However, City staff will continue to monitor the situation and determine the City's ability to safely operate the transit program prior to the start of the Spring school semester. Conserving Water – Protecting Our City

Did you know that inefficient watering methods and systems can result in a significant amount of water waste and higher water bills? As the state of California strives to achieve its mandated 25% state-wide water use reduction, it is vitally important that we as a community help to eliminate water waste. Fortunately, there are a few easy steps that you can undertake to help eliminate irrigation runoff and save on your water bill. Use this checklist to reduce water usage, preserve the environment, and cut water costs:

- Check sprinkler system frequently and adjust units so that only plants and lawn are watered
 - Water small lawn patches by hand
 - Aerate lawns to allow water to reach roots rather than runoff the surface
 - Check sprinkler system or drip lines periodically for leaks and broken equipment
 - Replace sprinklers with drip irrigation
 - Use a screwdriver to test soil moisture – If pushed into the soil easily, no need to water



How to Properly DISPOSE OF WASTE

Call for a free hazardous waste or bulky item pick-up today!



Residents can arrange to have hazardous waste or e-waste picked up at their home by calling our recycling hotline at 800-579-4979. These free pick-ups will be scheduled on a first-come first-served basis. In addition, residents can call 805-522-9400 to schedule a free pick-up of two bulky items twice per year.

Green bins can be used for more than just plant materials!

Did you know that your green waste can include food waste for both cooked and uncooked food? Bread, fruit, vegetables, tea bags, coffee grounds, fish, and meat can now be accepted in the green bin. Bones from meat or fish are not accepted and should be placed into the trash bin. Place the items in your bin alongside your tree trimmings and leaves. Feel free to throw in the extra takeout food, but place all food containers in the trash bin.
